Welcome!

The Classical Orchard exists to support Christian homeschool families in a classically-minded educational cooperative. We meet on Thursdays in Manhattan, KS at Faith Manhattan Church. What started out as a small group of fifteen families interested in forming a local co-op three years ago, has grown to an established community currently serving seventy-one families.

Each year high school students choose from an à la cart schedule. HS only parents are not required to stay on campus, though they are welcome. We offer core subjects and elective courses for our students based on student interest and instructor availability. We desire to support upper level families fulfill Kansas educational requirements for graduation through valuable classroom experiences with qualified, engaging instructors. Each class has a complete course description and student expectations provided by the instructor for families to review prior to registering their students in a class.

The Full-Time Family Orchard program (grades 1st-8th) requires that a parent stay on campus and serve in several classes. Roles include content teacher or homeroom teacher. Being a full-time family requires weekly commitment and a willingness to serve alongside others for a common goal. When the parent is not serving, they are free to fellowship for the remainder of their time at Orchard. Space is limited so we are considering serious inquiries only.

Our 25-26 catalog is released March 1 and our JOIN button will direct interested families to an application for pre-approval. Once pre-approved, families will receive notification on when class registration is open to register their student. Feel free to reach out with any questions.

Early Education Jami Berggren Early Ed Director

Homeschooling families must be a full day Orchard family to enroll in the following classes. Students will be led by hired preschool teams. All personnel are trained and background checked. The Early Education Director is a volunteer position. Jami Berggren will serve again as the 2025–2026 Early Education Director. Jami provides oversight of a crucial part of the Orchard that needs extra nurturing, attentiveness to detail, predictable routines, and flexibility.

Nursery Class

\$600 Grade Fee

The nursery serves younger Orchard siblings 6 months to 2 years. Nursery is led by a team of care givers. Our student to nursery teacher ratio is 1 to 4. It is a full day of calm, caring, and restful routine. Nursery provides allergen friendly snacks. Parents provide lunches, a diaper bag, blanket, and pack-n-play. This full day will require time and preparation to be certain students have what they need weekly.

Preschool Class

\$600 Grade Fee

This class serves younger Orchard siblings using the Gentle and Classical Preschool program. Students enjoy a full Orchard day routine including: circle time, snacks, sensory learning, craft time, recess, lunch, play learning, nap time and more. Parents pack a nap mat and nut-free snacks and lunch. Assuring students have what they need for the full day will require parental preparation of 15–20 minutes weekly.

Pre-Kinder Class

\$600 Grade Fee

Pre-Kinder serves younger Orchard siblings. Pre-K is taught by a pair of hired instructors. Students enjoy an Orchard day routine including: phonogram and pre-writing, show and tell, Christian Liberty Press Preschool Science, snack time, Memoria Press Junior Kindergarten, recess, lunch, play learning, and more. Parents pack a nap mat and nut-free snacks and lunch. Student having what they need for the full day will require parental preparation of 15-20 mins weekly.

Thursday 8:15 am - 3:30 pm

Elementary



Kristen Page Elementry Director

Homeschooling families must be a full day Orchard family to enroll in the following classes. The Elementary Director is a volunteer position. Mrs Page returns again next year as Elementary Director and provides oversight of a crucial part of the elementary student's experience including overseeing welcoming students, equipping teachers, safety practices, sub needs and dismissal. Orientation is required for all families.

Kinder \$350 Grade Fee

While kinder enrollment is for younger Orchard siblings, this class enjoys an Orchard day routine similar to first grade. Classes include Assembly, Science, Fine Arts, Presentation, Read -a-loud and several recesses. Students bring a presentation to share. Students having what they need for the full day will require parental preparation of 15-20 mins weekly.

1st \$350 Grade Fee

Students will be shepherded by a homeroom teacher and instructed by content teachers. Classes include Assembly, Science, Fine Arts, Spelling, Presentation, Read -a-loud and several recesses. Daily work at home includes 10–15 minutes for memory links, 5–10 minutes for practicing presentation. Parents choose a math and reading curriculum best suited for their student at home. Estimated book cost: \$25.

2nd \$350 Grade Fee

Students will be shepherded by a homeroom teacher and instructed by content teachers. Classes include Assembly, Science, Fine Arts, Spelling, Presentation, Read -a-loud and several recesses. Daily work at home includes 10–15 minutes for memory links, 5–10 minutes for practicing presentation. Cursive sheets (provided) and regular read alouds are encouraged. Parents choose a math and reading curriculm best suited for their student at home. Estimated book cost: \$25.

3rd \$350 Grade Fee

Students are shepherded by a homeroom teacher and instructed by content teachers. Classes include Assembly, Science, Fine Arts, Grammar, Writing, Read -a-loud and recesses. Daily work at home includes reviewing memory links (10 mins), daily grammar (15 mins), and IEW assignments (15–20 mins). Families choose their own math curriculm. Estimated book cost: \$50.

4th \$350 Grade Fee

Students are shepherded by a homeroom teacher and instructed by content teachers. Classes include Assembly, Science, Fine Arts, Grammar, Writing, Read -a-loud and recesses. Daily work at home includes reviewing memory links (10 mins), daily grammar (15 mins), and IEW assignments (15-20 mins). Families choose their own math curriculm.. Estimated book cost: \$50.

Thursday 8:15 am - 3:30 pm

Middle School



Homeschooling families must be a full day Orchard family to register in the following classes. The Middle School Director is a volunteer position. Shasta Long will serve as the 2025–2026 Middle School Director. Shasta provides oversight of a crucial part of the Orchard that includes welcoming students, supporting teachers, routines, safety practices, sub needs and dismissal.

5th-6th \$350 Grade Fee

Students will be shepherded by a homeroom teacher and instructed by content teachers. Daily work at home includes reviewing memory links (10 -30 mins), daily grammar (20 -30 mins), and IEW assignments (30-40 mins). Classes include: Claritas memory links, Grammar, Science, Writing (IEW), Fine Art and a class TBD. Families choose their own math curriculum for home. Orientation is required. Owning the IEW training or attending an 8 hour IEW training (free) is required. Books are not included in the grade fee and will cost approximately \$100.

7th-8th \$350 Grade Fee

Students will be overseen by a homeroom teacher and instructed by content teachers. Daily work at home is expected and varies by class. 7th and 8th graders will experience a significant increase in workload compared to 5th and 6th grade. Classes include: History, Science, (Apologia), Writing (IEW), Logic, Humanities + a class TBD. Families choose their own math curriculum for home. Orientation is required. Owning the IEW training or attending an 8 hour IEW training (free) is required. Books are not included in the grade fee and will cost approximately \$225.



Drama
Kendra Campbell

Full Year I \$300

An acting and production class which exposes students to many aspects of a theatrical experience. The course has regular exercises in impromptu acting, dramatic interpretation, and character development, as well as experiencing what's required behind the scenes. Students will learn how to use a variety of sources and multimedia to research, create, perform and refine dramatic and theatrical interpretations. Sacrifice of personal goals and input is a constant necessity for the sake of working together to create honest art. Students will be involved in dramatic experiences which will enrich the Orchard community. Students should leave this class with an understanding of how art can be selfless, humble, and collaborative while bringing glory to God. *Counts as 1 elective credit*.



American History

Full Year | \$300 Class Materials fee | \$50

This course will explore the sweep of American history, from the initial encounters between Europeans and Native Americans through the challenges of the 21st century. The class will provide a balanced approach to political and cultural issues, while also giving significant attention to religious and intellectual threads that have shaped the nation.



Spanish II
Andrea Osorio

Full Year | \$300 Class Materials fee | \$50

This class will present a unique opportunity to further learn the Spanish language from a native speaker. Ms. Osorio will be joining us weekly online from her home in Colombia. Students will be practicing conversational Spanish, grammar, learning culture and practicing self-reflection. Ms. Osorio describes her teaching style as "personal and learning through stories" with a Christian perspective. The uniqueness of this class is sure to produce questions. While the class meets in person weekly, instruction is virtual. Completion of a Spanish 1 class is a pre-requisite for enrollment.



Classic Literature

Jada Sharp

Full Year | \$300

This class will cover a sampling of Classic Literature from around the world: novels, poetry, speeches, letters, fairy tales, picture books, and the authors who wrote them. A wide range of works will be studied and discussed. Students will discuss the story line, author's purpose and influence, the historical context, and learn how to read carefully. Students will receive a book list prior to the beginning of class. It is recommended that students purchase the books because we will be making notes in them.



Speech

Melissa Basel

Fall I \$150

Speech (Fall Offering) – We'll be using IEW "Introduction to Public Speaking". From the publisher: "Students learn memory and delivery techniques as they write and present five speeches: self-introductory, narrative, expository, persuasive, and impromptu. Students evaluate recorded speeches in preparation for self-evaluation." Prior IEW families will enjoy continuity building on current knowledge, though NO PREVIOUS IEW experience is needed.



Debate

Melissa Basel

Spring | \$150

Debate (Spring Offering) – Students will learn Lincoln–Douglas style debate, studying the parts of an argument, how to evaluate sources and evidence, Lincoln–Douglas style, and argument formulation. We'll end the year with in–class debates. This class will teach both the thought process for persuasive arguments as well as how to debate.

Expectations: Students will have weekly homework assignments. Students should plan to bring a pencil and paper for taking notes.



Government

Blaine Darnell

Fall I \$150

The student will study Biblical teachings about government and leadership, definitions and historical examples of different forms of government, and the background to the American constitutional system. The course provides a thorough study of the U.S. Constitution and the workings of the federal government today. The student will also study state and local government, the revenue and budgeting process, international relations, specific issues that government faces today, and ways that the individual citizen can be involved in government. The student will read a significant number of original source documents and essays about government while studying the narrative of lessons. Students will be asked to purchase a book.



Economics

Blaine Darnell

Spring | \$150

The student will receive an introduction to Biblical teaching related to economics, economics in church history, and the economic history of the United States. The student will then explore the basics of macroeconomics and microeconomics, learning about markets, money, trade, business organization, and labor. The student will also learn how government is involved in the economy and look at modern economic challenges. The student will read a significant number of original source documents and essays about economics while studying the lessons. Students will be asked to purchase a book.

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Personal Finance

Sharp/Campbell/ Weddle

FALL | \$150

This high school personal finance course equips students with essential financial literacy skills to make informed money decisions. Taught from a Biblical worldview, students will learn key concepts such as budgeting, saving, investing, credit management, and entrepreneurship. Through real-world applications, led by a trio of Orchard dads who have years of financial and business experience, students will develop practical money management skills and an entrepreneurial mindset. By the end of the course, students will have a solid foundation in financial responsibility, preparing them for future financial independence and success. This course is designed to ignite your creativity and build your skills as a visual storyteller through the art of photography. Whether you're picking up a camera for the first time or looking to refine your abilities, you'll explore the technical and creative sides of photography while discovering more about yourself and the world of art. By the end of this course, you'll have a portfolio of work you're proud of, a deeper appreciation for photography's role in art history, and the confidence to communicate your vision—both behind the lens and beyond it. DSLR or mirroless camera recommended, but point-and-shoot or phone can work.



Art

TBA soon

Spring | \$150 Materials \$20

Introduction to Art instructs students in 912th grade on the basics of visual arts, both
conceptually and in practice, with an
emphasis on two-dimensional art. The \$20
materials fee is listed as students will use and
keep a variety of supplies. The weekly class
time is designated to instructor-developed
lessons that include relevant art history, select
artists, vocabulary, techniques, guided
practices, and demonstrations. Students will
also be provided designated class time to
work on larger projects.



Linguistics

Carol Russell

Full Year | \$300

This Linguistics course will explore the history of the English Language, beginning with Old English, then Middle English, Early Modern English, and end with a look at some modern English argots. Although there will be much time taking notes, there will be lots of time for questions, discussions and a myriad of ways to explore our language. While the class will meet in person weekly, the instruction will be hybrid - varying between in-person and virtual.

Algebra 1

10:40–11:55 75 MIN PERIOD Full Year | \$300 Online grading fee \$20

This Algebra 1 course will provide students with a college-prep math course that will give them the foundation they need to successfully move into higher levels of math. Saxon Algebra 1, 4th Edition covers all of the traditional first-year algebra topics while helping students build higher-order thinking skills, real-world application skills, reasoning, and an understanding of interconnecting math strands. Saxon Algebra 1 focuses on algebraic thinking through multiple representations, including verbal, numeric, symbolic, and graphical, while graphing calculator labs model mathematical situations. Students will need to own Saxon Algebra 1 textbooks. Online grading will be done through Nicole the Math Lady co-op account.

HS Block 4

Lunch

11:55-12:40 45 MIN PERIOD

High school students who attend all day or are in the building during this time will have a 45 minute lunch period. During this time there will be club meetings, student council meetings, and time for hanging out with friends. Students who are not on campus during this time may return for meetings when they occur.



Art

Renay Melcher

Fall | \$150 Materials \$25

This Intro to Art– Drawing 1 class will be a drawing focused class for high school students. The class time on Orchard day will be focused on learning about a drawing skill and working with Mrs. Melcher to apply it. There will be a take home sketchbook with drawing assignments as well as other homework assignments, including inspiration research and critiques. This class will be focused on basic drawing elements, shading, perspective drawings, still life's, portrait drawings and more.



Sign Language

Carol Russell

Fall | \$150

This beginning Sign Language course will focus on using Sign Language to communicate with the Deaf. We will work on introducing ourselves, asking questions, and some basic ways to interact using a signed language. A dictionary will be helpful. I use Signing Exact English, but any dictionary can work. You may want to have an online dictionary downloaded to use as a reference. Fun is the expectation. Learning Sign is the goal. Assessment will consist of forming the signs and reading the signs. While the class will meet in person weekly, the instruction will be hybrid - varying between in-person and virtual.



Coding

Jay Herrmann

Fall | \$150

This engaging, hands-on course introduces high school students to the fundamentals of computer programming using Python 3, one of the world's most popular and versatile programming languages. The course begins with visual programming concepts using Scratch to build a strong foundation in computational thinking, then transitions to text-based programming with Python.



Choir 7th-12th

Ashley Bray

Spring | \$150 \$15 music fee

This Choir class is designed for any students interested in using their God–Given instrument – the voice. The course will focus on some basic music theory, vocal techniques, choral tone, sight reading, and performance techniques in a Christ centered environment. The class time will also focus on learning the musical selections in the assigned vocal parts based on each student's vocal range. There will be a music theory lesson each week that may include homework to be graded by Mrs. Bray.



Intro to Cajon

Jennifer Altwegg

Spring | \$150

The Introduction to Cajon class is geared towards students with no previous musical experience OR students with experience on other instruments that are new to percussion. The goal of this class is to equip students with the musical skills and confidence required to play a cajon at a beginner level. Lessons will be geared towards fundamentals with the end goal of playing in a band setting, such as a worship team at a church. Students would purchase their own \$50-150 instrument.



Physics
Carol Regehr

Full Year I \$300

Apologia describes this course as follows: "Exploring Creation with Physics" is a college-prep course that provides a detailed introduction to the methods and concepts of general physics. Heavily emphasizing vector analysis, this text is ideal preparation for a university-level physics course. It provides the student with a strong background in one-dimensional and two-dimensional motion, Newton's laws and their application, gravity, work and energy, momentum, periodic motion, waves, optics, electrostatics, electrodynamics, electrical circuits, and magnetism." Prerequisites: Algebra, plus familiarity with the definitions of sine, cosine, and tangent. Use Saxon free math placement tests to determine readiness – your student should test into Advanced Math or higher to be prepared to study physics.



Spanish I

Full Year I \$300

Using Breaking the Spanish Barrier: ¡Vamos! Beginner "A" – both printed and online, students will study the beginning basics of the Spanish language, including basic vocabulary, present and preterite (past) tenses, subject and object pronouns, adjectives, ser/estar verbs, prepositions and conjunctions. We will look at different Spanish–speaking cultures and countries and engage in projects and activities in class and outside class. In order to communicate clear expectations, rubrics for projects and activities will be included in the detailed syllabus to be handed out the first day of class. (We will also utilize My Father's World's Foreign Language Enrichment Guide: Real Life Activities, which will be handed out then as well.)



Chemistry
Dr. Matthew Basel

Full Year | \$300 Lab fee | \$60

The chemistry class will be a laboratory focused high school chemistry course based on the Apologia Exploring Creation with Chemistry 3rd edition textbook. In order to facilitate a high school level laboratory course, class time at the Orchard will be dedicated to performing the associated laboratories each week. In order to be a rigorous, college-preparatory course, we will be performing each of the laboratories in the textbook as well as the laboratory exercises in the optional MicroCHEM kit.



Sewing 7th-12th

Melissa Basel

Full Year | \$300

This sewing class will be an introductory sewing class focused on apparel construction. Our learning will be project based. There will be several projects throughout the year. Students will get to pick out and keep their own finished projects that fit into the project guidelines.



Dr. Basel is an associate professor of physiology at the KSU College of Veterinary Medicine where he teaches a variety of courses including Systems Physiology, Cell Physiology, Biomedical Techniques, and Histology to professional and graduate students. He has a Ph.D. in Biological and Materials Chemistry and a Graduate Certificate in Teaching and Learning and has been

licensed (currently unused/expired) in the state of Kansas in secondary education with endorsements in chemistry, biology, and physics. Dr. Basel has received multiple teaching awards for his teaching at K-State, including receiving the first-year instructor of the year award multiple times. He and his wife have homeschooled their four children for the last twelve years and their oldest is about to graduate!

Melissa Basel has been homeschooling her four children since 2012. She enjoys watching her children progress from skill to skill and celebrating each tiny step of learning. Melissa began sewing as a small child with her mother. She has studied pattern design, history of clothing, apparel construction, and tailoring. Melissa has taught sewing classes for six years and looks forward to watching her students excel in their skills with each project.
